I, even I, am he who blots out your transgressions for my own sake, and remembers your sins no more. Isaiah 43:25

## Setting the stage for forgiveness: The first Servant Song

"Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen one in whom I delight;

I will put my Spirit on him and he will bring justice to the nations.

- He will not shout or cry out, or raise his voice in the streets.
- A bruised reed he will not break, and a smoldering wick he will not snuff out. In faithfulness he will bring forth justice;
- he will not falter or be discouraged till he establishes justice on earth. In his law the islands will put their hope."
- This is what God the LORD says—he who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread out the earth and all that comes out of it, who gives breath to its people, and life to those who walk on it:
- <sup>6</sup> "I, the LORD, have called you in righteousness;

I will take hold of your hand.

I will keep you and will make you to be a covenant for the people and a light for the Gentiles,

- to open eyes that are blind, to free captives from prison and to release from the dungeon those who sit in darkness.
- 8 "I am the LORD; that is my name!

I will not give my glory to another or my praise to idols.

before they spring into being I announce them to you."

Israel's only Savior But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior . . . . "You are my witnesses," declares the LORD, "and my servant whom I have chosen, so that you may know and believe me and understand that I am he. Before me no god was formed, nor will there be one after me. I. even I. am the LORD. and apart from me there is no savior. <sup>12</sup> I have revealed and saved and proclaimed— I, and not some foreign god among you. You are my witnesses," declares the LORD, "that I am God. Yes, and from ancient days I am he. No one can deliver out of my hand. When I act, who can reverse it?" 14 This is what the LORD says your Redeemer, the Holy One of Israel: "For your sake I will send to Babylon and bring down as fugitives all the Babylonians, in the ships in which they took pride. <sup>15</sup> I am the LORD, your Holy One, Israel's Creator, your King." 16 This is what the LORD says he who made a way through the sea, a path through the mighty waters, who drew out the chariots and horses, the army and reinforcements together, and they lay there, never to rise again, extinguished, snuffed out like a wick: <sup>18</sup> "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the desert and streams in the wasteland. Isaiah 43:1-19 1) Names ("Holy One of Israel" is Isaiah's name for his God)

2) a celebration of God's salvation (with a shout out to the Exodus)

3) "New" (= restoration) is the theme, as surprising as a new spring in the desert!

# The one who forgives

"I, even I, am he who blots out your transgressions, for my own sake, and remembers your sins no more. Review the past for me, let us argue the matter together; state the case for your innocence. 27 Your first father sinned; your spokesmen rebelled against me. <sup>28</sup> So I will disgrace the dignitaries of your temple, and I will consign Jacob to destruction and Israel to scorn. **44** "But now listen, O Jacob, my servant, Israel, whom I have chosen. This is what the LORD says he who made you, who formed you in the womb, and who will help you: Do not be afraid, O Jacob, my servant . . . . Isaiah 43:25-44:2 (see 1:18-20 for these themes at the beginning of Isaiah) 1) God reserves forgiveness for himself (see 43:11-13; Mark 2:3-12) 2) Forgiveness reveals the character of God 3) Forgiveness is both historical 4) Forgiveness transcends the sacrificial system (whatever religion system!)

#### Q & A 56

Q. What do you believe concerning "the forgiveness of sins"?

because of Christ's satisfaction, will no longer remember any of my sins<sup>1</sup> or my sinful nature which I need to struggle against all my life.<sup>2</sup>

God grants me the righteousness of Christ to free me forever from judgment.<sup>3</sup>


Q. What does the fifth petition mean?

A. "Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors" means:

Because of Christ's blood, do not hold against us, poor sinners that we are, any of the sins we do or the evil that constantly clings to us.<sup>1</sup>

Forgive us just as we are fully determined, as evidence of your grace in us, to forgive our neighbors.<sup>2</sup>
